Key Result Area 1 - Community Cricket

Vision

To support, maintain and increase participation in a safe and enjoyable environment and be recognised as the leading and most successful example of community participation in English cricket.

Objectives

To promote and facilitate the expansion of community participation in cricket at all levels for the broader benefit of the Kent community and to underpin the success of Kent and England teams.

To manage the delivery of the following core programmes: Focus Club Community Clusters, ECB Affiliated Club Services and facility development.

To increase investment into cricket clubs and district programmes.

To ensure effective local communication and planning through the management and leadership of the countywide network of District Development Groups.

To manage the strategic deployment of human and financial resources within the district development programmes.

To provide support to the county wide District Cricket Development Officer network.

To secure the services of an integrated sports development network with external partners such as County Sports Partnerships (Pro-Actives and Kent SDU), School Sport Partnerships and Local Authority sports development teams.

To manage and be accountable for performance of core programmes against agreed Key Performance Indicators via the County Board Management System.

Strategies

- Formulate and assist in the implementation of strategies to encourage growth in participation.
- Develop a plan to encourage greater participation by those groups in the community who have not historically been actively involved in cricket.
- Research community participation good practice in sport both within England and internationally.
- Support a comprehensive network of District Development Groups.
- Offer one to one support for District Development Officers.
- Improve the strategic planning and administrative competence of cricket clubs through the Focus Club scheme.
- Maintain, and review Focus Club Community Clusters based on strategic need and available resources.

- Establish a process of continuous operational review and improvement planning.
- Strengthen partnerships with sport development networks.
- Further develop the player pathway to encourage greater community participation in playing, coaching, umpiring and administration by supporting the High Performance strategy.
- Support all clubs to achieve and maintain ECB accreditation - ClubMark.
- Promote the KCB Club Membership packages and ensure they offers genuine value.
- Ensure the long term sustainability of the Chance to shine programme.

Performance Measures

- Player participation growth of 1% per annum over the three year period.
- All Focus Clubs have signed up to the KCB FCCC MoU.
- All Focus Clubs have produced annual approved Development Plans.
- The Focus Club Community Cluster programme is prioritised and phased.
- Increase number of Focus Clubs to 48.
- Positive trend in the percentage of first time participants who stay within the club structure and Kent Cricket Board programmes.
- All clubs have within their coaching structure have as a minimum one UKCC2 nationally accredited coach.
- No net loss in grounds for the playing of cricket.
- Work to KCB facilities Strategy to ensure that FCCCs have the appropriate cricket facilities.
- Improve five FCCC squares to PQS 'high'.
- Five FCCCs to have received ECB Grant Aid facility upgrades.
- Five FCCCs to have updated machinery via ECB fund.
- Volunteer recruitment and retention increase significantly.
- School cricket programmes expanded through partnerships with secondary and primary schools.
- 'Chance to shine' programmes used to create links between schools and clubs.
- Encouragement of greater participation from community groups who historically have not been involved in cricket.
- Efforts of volunteers actively recognised and reward.
- Under 13 Girls Club league with 16 sustainable club sides with a minimum of one club in each District.
- Under 15 Girls club League in place with 8 sides competing.
- Ensure that any FCCC without provision for women and girls cricket creates a strong link with a club that does.

ECB Focus Club Community Cluster Definition

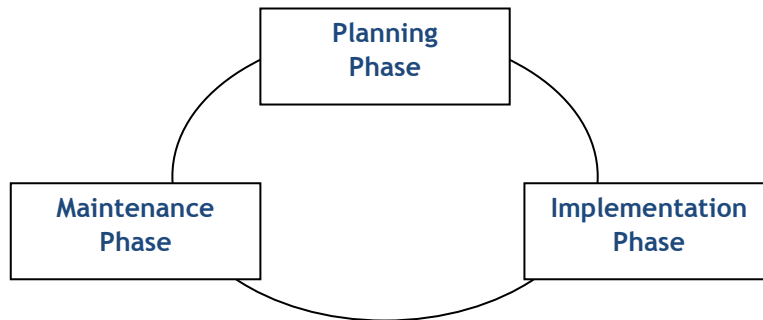
A cricket club that:-

- Is affiliated to the ECB via the County Cricket Board.
- Is committed to achieving the objectives within 'Building Partnerships'.
- Will work in partnership with ECB, the County Cricket Board, schools and the community to deliver high quality agreed development plan outcomes.
- Has achieved or is committed to achieving and maintaining ECB ClubMark Accreditation evidencing that they are a safe, effective and child friendly club.
- Has a club development plan that has been approved by the County Cricket Board and is reviewed and updated on an annual basis.

Selected by County Cricket Boards on the basis that:-

- They are identified as a key deliverer within the County Cricket Board strategic development plan.
- They are committed strategically to delivery of junior development programmes and/or development activities with specific target groups (disability, women/girls, and ethnic minorities).
- They are able to access and utilise ECB, County Cricket Board and local development resources to support the delivery of their club development plan.

Focus Club Community Cluster Programme Phases



Planning Phase

- A process by which Community Cricket Managers (CCMs) and external sports development partners will support focus clubs to plan and write their club development plan.
- Club signs up to KCB FCCC MoU
- Club achieves ClubMark

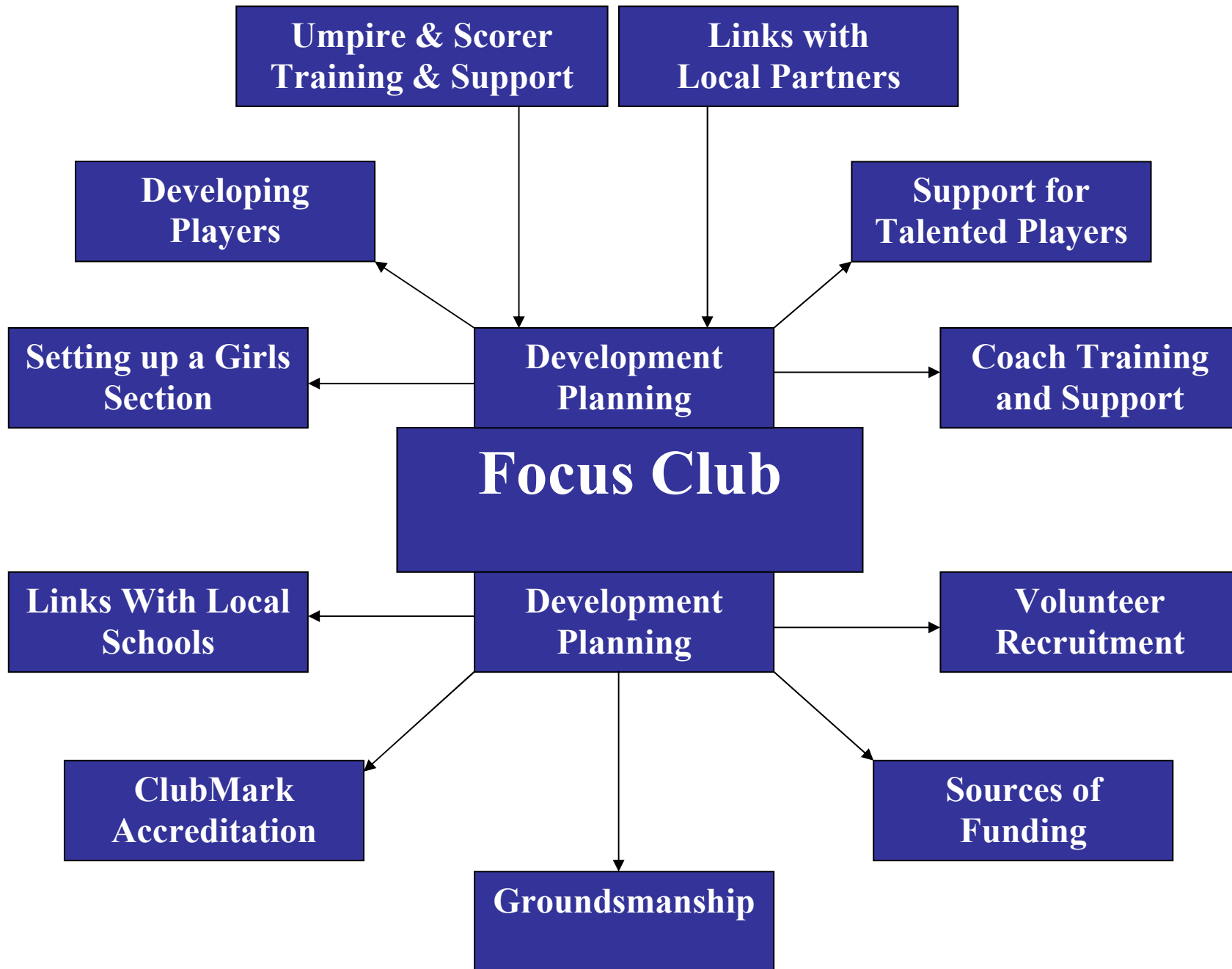
Implementation Phase

- CCMs support focus clubs to complete the actions within their club development plan.
- Focus clubs become a priority for support, advice, resource and investment from their County Cricket Board, CDM and external sports development partners against their approved club development plan.
- Single Investment System begins

Maintenance Phase

- Ongoing and consistent support from County Cricket Boards, CCMs and external partners.
- Annual review of support, resources, and advice.
- Evidence of outcomes, achievements and goals
- Annual review of club development plan

Focus Clubs - just what can be achieved



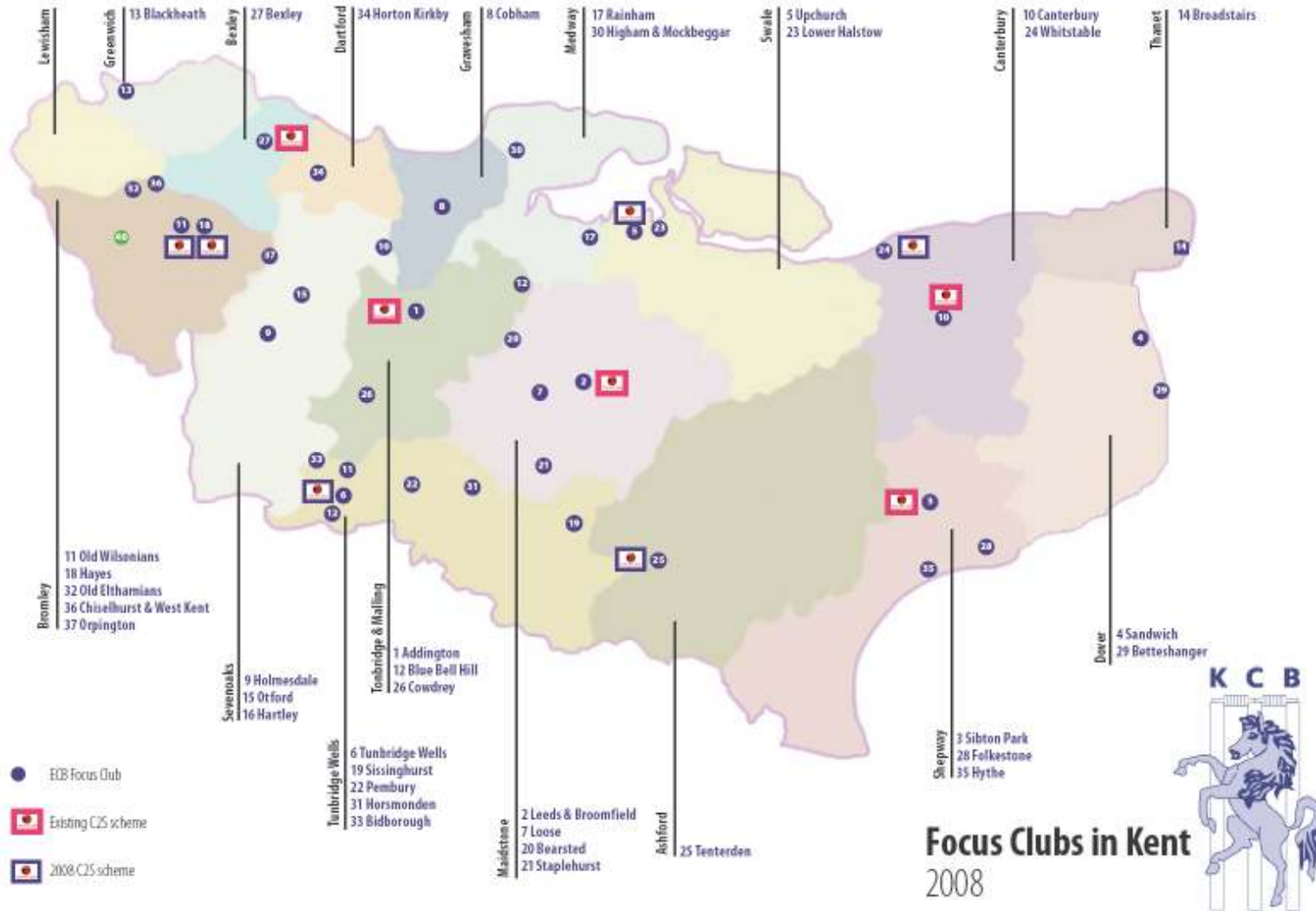
What are KCB objectives for Focus Club development?

- To promote the development of cricket clubs for young people through enhanced club school links and extended community access.
- To promote the development of 'hub/beacon' clubs that create club networks and pathways through sport linked to the KCB development programmes.
- To ensure that Cricket Clubs offer opportunities for all those wishing to participate in the game as players, coaches, groundsmen, scorers, umpires and administrators as a key piece of succession planning and personal development to sustain the needs of the game.
- To ensure that Cricket Clubs become the focus for the provision of local community cricket, including inner-city areas and that these clubs then increase the resources available to KCB to offer more support to all stakeholders.
- To ensure that facility investment is supported by adequate investment in the training and development of key people (coaches, officials and administrators).

KCB's FCCC Memorandum of Understanding

KCB has developed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) that clearly outlines the commitments required from the club and the guarantees that the club can expect from KCB. The document has to have been signed by a club before it can move to the 'implementation phase'.

2009-10	At this stage it is not possible to detail the 2009-10 programme. By then there will be 48 clubs that are FCCCs - the full ECB allocation - it will be vital at that time to access the level of support and resource implications required to maintain this programme.		

ECB Accreditation - ClubMark

ECB ClubMark Assessment

- ECB ClubMark Assessment has two elements:
 - I. Assessment of the ECB ClubMark Evidence File - using the ECB ClubMark Evidence File Checklist
 - II. ECB ClubMark Site Visit using the ECB ClubMark Site Visit Checklist - an assessment of the cricket club's venue and how it has implemented and communicated the policies and procedures within ECB ClubMark .
- Assessment of the ECB ClubMark Evidence File can take place at any time of year.
- The ECB ClubMark Site Visit assessment can only take place between April and the end of August.
- Cricket clubs will be notified of a 4 week period during which the ECB ClubMark Site Visit will take place. This ensures that the Site Visit is a true reflection of the day to day running of the club at the same time as giving clubs time to prepare.
- Cricket clubs will be deemed to have achieved ECB ClubMark only when the outcome of assessment for both the Evidence File and Site Visit is positive.
- ECB ClubMark accreditation status lasts for 3 years.

ECB ClubMark Annual Health Check

- ECB ClubMark accredited clubs will undertake an Annual Health at the end of the 1st year and 2nd year of their accreditation
- This is a self declaration process using the ECB ClubMark Annual Health Check Checklist

ECB ClubMark Re-accreditation

- Every third year cricket clubs will be required to review their ECB ClubMark Evidence File and to re-submit valid evidence.
- To maintain ECB ClubMark accreditation status cricket clubs will need to complete the ECB ClubMark assessment process again.

Whereas:

1. Kent Cricket Board (KCB) is a Cricket Board responsible for the awarding of FOCUS CLUB COMMUNITY CLUSTER status and the continuous monitoring of the performance of Clubs so awarded
2. The Club is a cricket club which has accepted the award of FOCUS CLUB COMMUNITY CLUSTER (FCCC) status by KCB and the continuous monitoring of such status

What are Focus clubs?

There are in excess of 1,400 Focus Clubs which have been strategically identified across England and Wales. On average each Focus Club will work in partnership with four schools and one community group. This equates to over 5,600 schools and 1,400 community groups. These Focus Clubs are currently registered and actively working towards ECB ClubMark.

More than 850 Focus Clubs have achieved the prestigious ECB ClubMark accreditation putting in place and maintaining the required minimum operating standards for community club cricket.

By the end of September 2007 675 Focus Clubs will have had an approved club development plan articulating in detail the current and planned goals, aspirations and needs of that focus club.

The Focus Club Community Cluster Programme has made a difference to community club cricket by encouraging the targeted allocation of capital and revenue investment to a number of strategically important cricket clubs. Kent Cricket Board is going through a rigorous process of identifying Focus Clubs Community Clusters based on strategic need, available resources and commitment from the Club and its cluster schools.

In addition to targeted investment Kent Cricket Board has prioritised the support packages provided to Focus Club Community Clusters. Focus Clubs will be able to receive dedicated priority time and support from the Cricket Development Manager and additional time and support from Kent Cricket Board and the County Sports Partnerships.

The long term vision for the ECB Focus Club Community Cluster Programme is for over 1,000 Focus Clubs to achieve ECB ClubMark accreditation and have an approved club development plan.

Kent Cricket Board will prioritise support, time and resources into Focus Clubs and their clusters to ensure the planned cricket development at Focus Clubs is resourced and successfully achieved, maintained and celebrated.

The parties therefore agree as follows:

1. Obligation of the club.

The Club has agreed to:

- 1.1. be a paid-up Premium Member of KCB
- 1.2. maintain ClubMark accreditation through the series of Annual Health Checks and the re-accreditation process to the timetable asked for by England and Wales Cricket Board (ECB)
- 1.3. remain committed to the objectives of the current ECB Strategic Plan, “Building Partnerships”
- 1.4. appoint a senior point of contact (and an alternate) who will act as FCCC contact with KCB for all matters relating to FCCC business
- 1.5. provide a senior member of the FCCC (or an alternate) to attend the District Development Group (and identify members who may have the skills to sit on other KCB Committees from time to time)
- 1.6. endeavour to achieve the objectives of KCB in relation to Focus Clubs as published from time to time
- 1.7. submit an annual written copy, and where necessary an electronic version (ECB CBMS), of a Club Development Plan and commit to monitoring and evaluation by KCB, demonstrating the impact made locally
- 1.8. ensure coaching and playing programmes for schools and organisations in the geographic area of FCCC is made available through DDG where appropriate
- 1.9. ensure the Club’s cricket playing programme is within competitions, Leagues etc. that are affiliated to KCB and part of the approved Kent League Structure
- 1.10. commit to undertake a NatWest CricketForce or similar volunteering event prior to the start of each season within the cluster
- 1.11. commit to nominating, each year, volunteers from FCCC for consideration for OSCAs and ECBCA volunteer awards
- 1.12. commit to hosting one KCB event per season, such as a Kwik Cricket Festival or KYC game or practice
- 1.13. provide any Club in the Focus Club cluster with Child Welfare Officer facilities, including having a point of contact for Clubs that may not have one currently
- 1.14. offer club coaches to be available for district coaching and running District teams
- 1.15. offer young players to be available on Coach Education course assessment days
- 1.16. offer to host UKCC 2 candidates for their ‘assisted coaching’ module
- 1.17. offer facilities, equipment and advice on pitch and playing surfaces’ performance, access to ground maintenance equipment and suppliers to clubs in the cluster, particularly that funded by ECB grant or loan
- 1.18. maintain regular contact with relevant KCB ClubMark Officer
- 1.19. communicate with other clubs in the cluster regularly
- 1.20. commit to the behaviours of an Open club as defined by ECB

Obligations of Kent Cricket Board (KCB)

KCB, in addition to Premium member club benefits, for the duration of the Club's continued status as a KCB FCCC, will:

- 2.1. provide advice on matters of welfare, funding, club management, duty of care to Focus Clubs to build and strengthen the development of a quality and sustainable cricket programme within the County of Kent
- 2.2. provide a clear pathway for talented players in the Focus Club cluster
- 2.3. provide a suitable support network to Focus Clubs in order to facilitate the development of any future initiative
- 2.4. provide access to subsidies for ECB Coach Education courses via national sponsorship (Sky Sports) or County Boards and priority allocation of places.
- 2.5. provide assistance to FCCC and give advice on aspects of the administration and playing the game such as:
 - purchase and maintenance of ground equipment, eg non-turf pitches & nets
 - coaching, equipment and competition for Junior Members
 - developing Club/School links
 - providing Cricket for the Disabled
 - funding Training courses for coaches, groundsmen, umpires, scorers
 - achieving Community Amateur Sports Club status
 - lobbying key partners to help support activity and/or facility developments
- 2.6. assist in recruiting key and specific volunteers to help junior programmes
- 2.7. offer support in gaining additional support by creating links with local partners
- 2.8. to help better plan and deliver coaching and match programmes
- 2.9. provide technical advice to help plan and deliver facility improvements
- 2.10. offer support and advice on raising funds from local and national sources
- 2.11. provide where possible, direct funding and/or priority for indirect funding through ECB Single Investment System (SIS), including that machinery fund
- 2.12. provide opportunity (subject to selection) to participate in "Chance to Shine" initiative
- 2.13. priority endorsement of Lord's Taverners equipment and grant aid applications
- 2.14. award a pavilion plaque to recognise ClubMark accreditation and Focus Club Status
- 2.15. prioritise time and support from Cricket Development Managers (CDMs), including achieving and maintaining ECB ClubMark.
- 2.16. offer priority access to the Community Club Grant Aid Programmes through the ECB Single Investment System (SIS).
- 2.17. extend an invitation to participate in the 'Chance to shine' programme, managed by the Cricket Foundation, to regenerate competitive cricket in State Schools.
